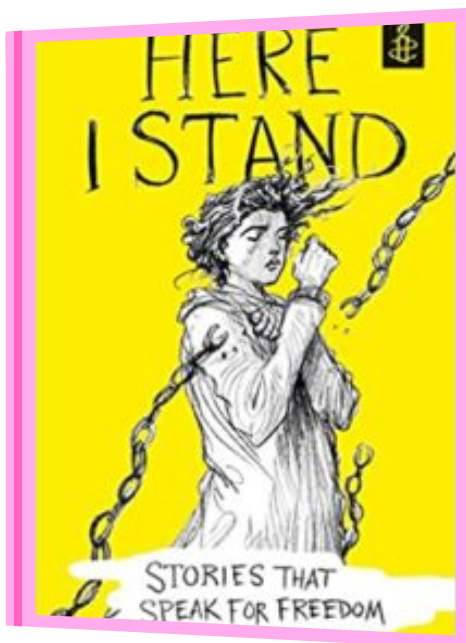

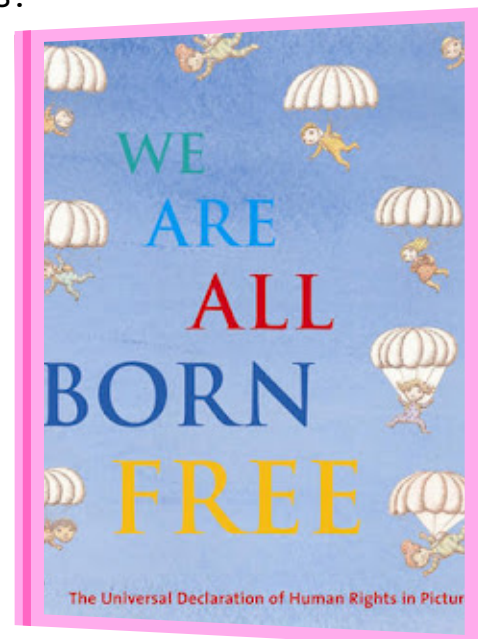
SCAN ME

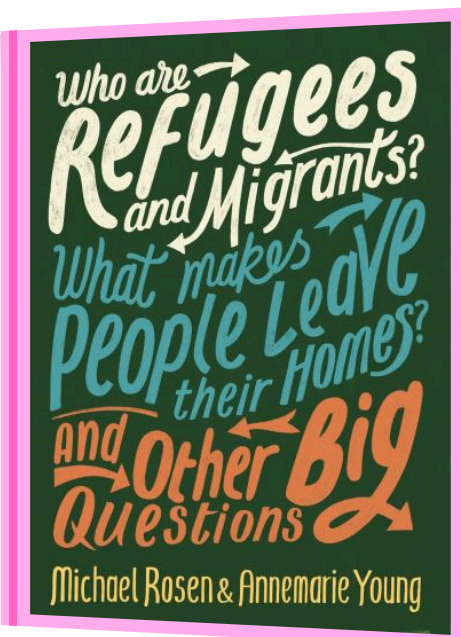
We all want a good life, to have fun, to be safe, happy and fulfilled.
