Bosco goes green!

As part of our mission to become eco-friendlier and more sustainable, we joined the Don Bosco Green Alliance.

The alliance is an international programme where Salesian communities globally join forces to support Pope Francis' Laudato Si', and his passion for the environment.

As part of the programme, we set out three clear commitments that will see us develop green areas within our school:

- 1. Planting more trees across the school's grounds
- 2. Supporting the development of small-scale ecosystems
- 3. Striving towards a school environment which reduces waste including paper, plastic and food

The Bosco eco-club has been busy working towards setting the foundations to deliver on these commitments and recently helped transform the Year 8 yard into what promises to be a beautiful space in bloom.

We received generous donations of oak seeds thanks to our partnership with the Tree Council, as well as dedicated staff members supplying sunflower seeds and plant pots to the project. Students named each of the seeds, including one named after our patron saint, Don Bosco. The Don Bosco Green Alliance has already celebrated the students' work after sharing their

new project with Salesian communities globally. The eco-club has already started planning for future green projects including bird feeders and bug hotels!

Eco-club lead, Mrs Armstrong, said: "We are delighted to be a part of the Don Bosco Green Alliance and have our student's incredible work shared with a network of Salesian communities globally.

"We have big plans at the eco-club and lots more seeds to plant. This is just the beginning of our eco-club and the start of our school's commitment to become more eco-friendly."












We hosted our biggest careers fair in history!

Students head to Shrewsbury Prison

Year 13 students visited Shrewsbury Prison to explore the inner workings of the UK prison system and how it works as part of their criminology studies.

22 criminology students gained first-hand experience inside a prison and explored the potential successes and failures of the prison system.

Guided around by the prison by a former prison guard, students learned what prison life was like before Shrewsbury Prison was decommissioned in March 2013.

The visit was organised by Mrs Donnelly, head of psychology and criminology, to support students in their upcoming exam in June.

Mrs Donnelly said: "It is so important that our students are exposed to experiences that enhance and deepen their knowledge and understanding of subjects.

"The visit to Shrewsbury Prison was an excellent opportunity for our criminology students to hear a first-hand account from a former prison guard and gain a deeper understanding of how the UK prison system works and explore its successes and failures.

"Each of the students represented the school incredibly. They fully immersed themselves in the experience, asking thought-provoking questions and working together to complete challenges."

Students also had the opportunity to participate in a 'cell escape' activity, where they worked together in groups to complete several puzzles under timed conditions to escape the cell.

The trip was a huge success, with students sharing how beneficial they found it.

One student said: "I really enjoyed the day; it has helped with my understanding of unit four."

While another added how 'eye-opening' the experience was, they said: "It was a really eye-opening experience. The tour guide was informative and shared his experience as a guard in other prisons."





Students delivered a show-stopping production of Sister Act

In January, over 60 students put on multiple show-stopping performances of the iconic production, Sister Act.

Students from Years 7 to 11 got involved in the production with the talented performers acting, singing and dancing their way around the Bosco stage, performing to over 400 parents, carers, and members of the local community across two evening shows.

The cast also delivered a special matinee performance to 300 primary school students.

From the moment the curtain went up, the students captivated the audience. Applause and laughter echoed through the room, with cast members even encouraged to return to the stage for a final bow.

The production was directed by Mr Gaffney, performing arts teaching assistant and Miss Shawcroft, drama teacher. Music teacher, Miss Finnigan, was musical director.

Mr Gaffney said: "Once again, our pupils delivered an incredible performance. Their ability to come together and embody every character in a way that brings the story of Sister Act to life is amazing, and to see the members of our audience smiling, laughing, and completely compelled was fantastic.

"The dedication shown by every performer, right from the auditions and up to the shows themselves has been phenomenal. I am incredibly proud of what they have achieved, and we are already looking forward to the next musical."

In the summer of 2023, Young Writers challenged secondary school students to write a mini saga in the thrilling world of crime and mystery with Unsolved.

Our true crime fans jumped at the chance to get involved, and three of those who submitted their sagas were published. A massive congratulations to our authors, *Lily B, 8C, Demi-Lea M, 10B, and Taylor W, 8C*. Each student was given a certificate, a limitededition Unsolved bookmark, and a copy of the short story collection of *Unsolved – Tales of Peril*, where their work features.

In May 2023, some of our young budding poets took centre stage in the Poetry Idol 2023 competition, where children of all school ages were asked to write a poem about their favourite person.

Two of our incredible students were selected for publication. Congratulations to *Angel L, 9J* and *Darcy May T, 11C*. Both students received limited edition bookmarks, and their work was featured in two separate anthologies, *Poetry Idol – Across the Page* and *Poetry Idol – Creative Stars*.


For a special treat, sixth form students headed off the school grounds to Hollywood Bowl for a round of bowling.

Students secure an impressive second place at prestigious STEM Challenge

In March, two students from Year 10, Teigan and Maisie, secured an impressive second place in the prestigious Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) Northwest Challenge.

The STEM Northwest Challenge, hosted at the University of Manchester, provides a platform for students across the Northwest to explore STEM topics and develop essential and transferrable skills such as teamwork and problem-solving.

The event aims to showcase the importance of STEM-based subjects and how these can help shape the future workforce, welcomed eight teams of students from schools across the Northwest.

The tough competition saw the two Bosco students join forces with students from Calday Grange Grammar School to represent Merseyside.

The team were tasked with programming a robot to work out its way around a maze. The maze, which got progressively more challenging as the robot faced new obstacles, presented an opportunity for the students to think reactively and work together to solve problems.

Colour and sound sensors were used to help navigate the maze and its many obstacles. Teigan and Maisie completed a series of tests to assess why something failed and developed solutions to resolve the issues.

Once the testing phase was completed, Teigan and Maisie's robot had to race against the opposing team's robots to claim the winning spot. After narrowly missing out on first place, both students were commended by the event organisers for demonstrating excellent teamwork.

Teigan said: "The whole experience was great, but it was challenging from the start. It was exciting when we overcame each challenge and obstacle; it was like lots of mini wins!"

After being awarded second place, both students shared how proud they were of the achievement. Maisie said: "We were awarded our certificate by the head of computer science at the University of Manchester, who shook our hand and congratulated us; it was an incredible experience. We were so happy."

Mr Edwards, the science technician at St John Bosco Arts College, attended the event with Teigan and Maisie, he said: "Teigan and Maisie represented the school incredibly. They demonstrated impressive skills and impeccable manners; they should be very proud."
